WHAT IS THE IB DIPLOMA PROGRAM?

IB stands for International Baccalaureate. The program is a challenging two-year program of studies that will prepare you for university. You take it in grades 11 and 12. It is taught from an international perspective, which means that you will learn about the world in every subject. IB courses are more challenging than most other high school courses. They demand high standards, for example, in critical thinking, oral expression, and written language.

Earning IB certificates

You also have the option of taking one or more IB courses as part of your high school program. You would earn a certificate for each IB course that you complete successfully.

How to prepare

You can prepare immediately by working especially hard in mathematics and English language arts. In grade 10 you will have the chance to find out if this program is right for you. Your school may offer one or more pre-IB courses that will give you a taste of the challenges ahead in the IB program. These courses will also help you find out if you have what it takes to do well in the IB program. WHAT OTHER STUDENTS HAVE ASKED ABOUT THE PROGRAM

Will I have time for other activities and a social life?

Most students find that they do have time. You will need to be involved in many activities to meet the Creativity, Action, and Service requirements. Some of these are probably things you are already enjoying now. These varied activities also help you develop a wide circle of friends.

Is there a lot of homework?

Yes, but most students find IB homework both interesting and challenging. High school usually involves much more homework than junior high, whatever program you choose.

Do I have any choice of courses?

There are some required courses such as English language arts and mathematics, but you will be able to choose four other courses from other subject areas. For example, most IB schools will offer biology, physics, and chemistry, and you can choose either one or two of those science courses.

Talk to your teacher or guidance counsellor to learn more about course options.




